Children's Church



It's a time of investment in the "stock", or the value of the player's assets that will be available to tap into in the busy days ahead. All of this is surprisingly not unlike summer in our church; although it's "off-season", there is a lot of energy at work behind and in front of the scenes investing in our stock for the season ahead.

Recently, I asked Connie to comment on her personal understanding of prayer, its intentions, and its power. Her answer appears here: What is prayer? Prayer is a conversation with God. Through prayer we can align ourselves with our creator! His presence is revealed to us. We grow in our love and worship of him. Our Life becomes fuller, richer, and more peaceful. A good prayer life, in my estimation, is being aware of God's presence. We turn over control of our life to him and do his will.

Prayer is the single most important thing that we can do to know God and to be in union with him. If we do not have prayer in our life, our priorities get mixed up!

Connie and her team of Prayer Warriors pray regularly, not just for themselves, but for our whole church congregation and for the special needs and prayer requests sent to their attention. Many of us are not as connected to active prayer as this team is and may be looking for ways to gain deeper insight into the act of daily prayer. For reading on prayer, Connie recommends *The Prayerful Spirit*, by James Gills, M.D. Along with this, Pastor Steve will be holding a **Prayer Workshop Series** on **Wednesday evenings in July** in our chapel. Join him to learn about practical prayer on **July 17th**, **24th**, and **31st from 6:30—7:30** and discover new ways to connect to the power that prayer provides.

Walk to Emmaus [Team Leader ~ Dave and Roz Hill]

Luke relates a story of two disciples of Christ who were going along the road from Jerusalem to Emmaus, a town about ten miles away. As the two friends were walking together, they shared their grief and concerns about the recent death of Jesus. An unknown person joined them and proceeded



to explain the scriptures to them as they walked. Toward the end of the day's travel, they urged the stranger to eat with them. As the stranger took bread, blessed, broke, and shared it with them, their eyes were opened and they recognized the risen Christ. Then they rushed back to Jerusalem to share the good news.

The modern Walk to Emmaus is a 72 hour experience of Christian spiritual renewal and formation. You will enjoy three busy days of singing, learning, laughing, praying, worshiping, and discussing. These discussions center around talks given by laity and clergy regarding God's grace, how that grace comes alive in the modern Christian community, and how it expresses itself in today's world. You will discover how grace is real in daily life, how to live a life of grace, and how to bring that grace to others. In the end, you will have experienced Christian love in action that will equip you for new levels of grace-filled service and leadership.



Spotlight on < United Women in Faith

In 1869, Clementina Butler and Lois Parker, wives of missionaries to India, made a plea to 8 women at the Tremont Street Methodist Episcopal Church in Boston about the spiritual and physical needs of poor women in India. They could not be treated by male doctors. Schooling for girls was almost non-existent. Help was desperately needed.

The 8 women were moved to action. They quickly organized. The Methodist Woman's Foreign Missionary Society as formed and funds were raised to send educator Isabella Thoburn to India. Clara Swain, MD soon followed with her medical skills and doors began to open. The Isabella Thoburn College, the region's first wom-



en's college remains operational today. By 1903, 34 years later, the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church had 265 missionaries carrying on the work tending to the physical and spiritual needs of women and children in India, China, Japan, Korea, Africa, Bulgaria, Italy, South America, Mexico, and the Philippines by means of women's colleges, high schools, seminaries, hospitals, dispensaries, day schools, and "settlement work".

In 1875, the Women's Missionary Association of the United Brethren Church as formed and two strong Women's Home Missionary Societies were founded – the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Protestant Church in 1879 and the Women's Missionary Society of the Evangelical Association in 1884. These groups became

powerful, independent women's organizations, sending hundreds of women missionary doctors, nurses, and educators all over the world and supporting countless US and international projects and advocating for justice, children, women, and disenfranchised communities.

Ladies' Aid Societies were started in the early 1900s and in 1972, United Women in Faith first became the women's mission organization as part of the United Methodist Board of Global Ministries. In 2012, the United Methodist Church General Conference voted to make United Methodist Women's national policy making body autonomous.

When the Methodist Church in Zephyrhills was formed, women served as helpers wherever they were needed. Not unlike today, women were teachers, housekeepers, cooks, organizers, and savers. They saw need and sought to fill it. Today, women in our church sing in the choir, teach Sunday school, serve as lecturers, care for children in the nursery, use their talents to sew, paint, and cook. They run the office, dispatch help, and coordinate the assets. We are willing helpers in service. Meetings begin with prayer and devotions and continue with a discussion of current business and sharing of joys and concerns. The United Women in Faith Unit meets the second Thursday of each month, September through May, for lunch and fellowship at noon in the Cooper Hall. After lunch, members enjoy presentations from a variety of sources – local dignitaries, service providers, and agencies that help care for women and children in need. They assemble visitors bags for visitors to Sunday services, craft cards for soldiers in war zones and patients in hospital care and they hold two fundraisers – one in the spring and one in the fall. Funds raised support United Women in Faith as well as local and regional charities. The Purpose of United Women in Faith is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ; to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

Presently, United Women in Faith in Zephyrhills sports 41 members and 1 circle. Some of the Projects supported by the group include the Zephyrhills High School ABC Program, Farmworkers Self Help Inc, Meals on Wheels, Woodland Elementary, Lowell Correctional Institute Oasis Program, Sunrise of Pasco, Cornerstone Ministries, Caterpillars to Butterflies, and Southeastern Guide Dogs. 



July Monthly Mission [Sunday Speaker 07/14 ~ Tana Day]

Our July mission focus is the same as June, our Food Pantry, which continues to be an important part of our church's outreach ministry.

Though summer is not a time that is typically thought of as a 'donation' time, the need does not stop based on the date. Volunteers provide the work, from helping fill the bags to distributing them. During the distribution week, our volunteers get to know the people that come and are often able to lend a muchneeded listening ear. We have compiled a list of additional local resources, which is often shared by the volunteers when asked about other services. Each of our volunteers provide a vital piece to the mission, not just in sorting and packing groceries and goods, but in reaching out face to face with those in need in our local community.



THAT EVERY TABLE BE FILLED

If a family is unable to collect their food during distribution week, there is an option to fill out a form allowing someone else to pick it up for them. There are several individuals using that option, including one lady who picks up food for ten families, and four children that collect food for their parents. Finally, when there is an emergency need, families can receive a bag of food by presenting ID at the church office when it is open. In any given month that number ranges as high as 15 to 20 families.

Any and all pantry donations to the Food Pantry are sincerely appreciated and help allow this ministry to continue and expand. Thank you for your generous giving.

What are some "special needs"?

- Wheelchairs, or walkers
- Special bed, chair, or toiletHealth sustaining equipment
- like oxygen or tube feeding
- Daily medical or care support
- Unique transportation needs

If you or a loved one has **special needs** this storm season, be sure to take them into account when developing your hurricane safety plans. Special needs will add a measurable level of complexity to your safety plans!

Register With Your County Emergency Management Agency--Pasco County, like other counties in Florida, are required to voluntarily register people who need evacuation assistance in the event of an emergency such as a hurricane. In an evacuation, appropriate vehicles will be sent to transport pre-registered county residents to a public shelter, special needs unit, or hospital. <u>Transportation will not be provided to private destinations such as a relative's home.</u> If your special needs require that you go to a special needs shelter or hospital, consult with your physician now about the need for a signed authorization letter. Prior planning is key to weathering severe storms safely and healthfully.

MAKE A DISASTER PREPARDENESS NOTEBOOK

Include the following information and keep it handy always:

- Your vital information such as name, address, phone, SS#
- Contact information for friends and relatives to contact
- Medical providers' names and contact information
- Insurance papers

Agape Flights was founded by Keith and Clara Starkey on October 24, 1980. In the words of Clara Starkey, "God laid it on our hearts to buy an aircraft to fly supplies into Haiti." They chose the Greek word for love, AGAPE (the unconditional love He has for each of us) to describe their mission and their ministry.

On November 15, 1980, Agape's inaugural flight left the Sarasota-Bradenton International Airport, bound for Cap Haitien, Haiti. The small Cessna 411 was loaded with donated emergency supplies and mail for about 25 missionary families. Today, Agape Flights serves as a lifeline from family, friends, and supporters to more than 300 missionary families in Haiti, the Dominican Republic and the Bahamas.

Agape Flights is a faith-based organization. Not the faith that just says, "Yes, I believe," but the kind of faith that leads to action. The kind of faith that moves two retired farmers from Ohio to Bradenton, Florida, nudges them to mortgage their home to buy an aircraft (which they didn't know how to fly or maintain by the way), and begin flying supplies and mail to missionaries in Haiti. Keith and Clara Starkey founded Agape Flights on radical faith and love, and today, 40 years later, their legacy of love and faith flies on week after week, serving 300 missionary affiliates throughout Haiti, the Bahamas, and the Dominican Republic...impacting millions.

A love of God. A love of people. A love to serve. Keith and Clara saw firsthand the transformative power of the love and care of Christ as they worked alongside missionaries in Haiti. That is why they stepped out in faith, bought an aircraft, turned their home into a mail and cargo center and chose the name "Agape" (God's unconditional love) for this Christian aviation ministry.

GIVING BACK [RMDs and Qualified Charitable Donations]

We make many investments in our lives, perhaps one of the most significant is the investment we make in our spiritual life and community. Whether we give of our talents, our energies, our time, or our financial resources, when we give back, we invest in the practical application of our faith. Investment is particularly important now that our property assets are no longer held in trust by a larger organization but have been transferred directly to our local church stewardship.

For most of us, our monetary donations are in the forms of electronic tithes, envelopes, or cash put into the Sunday offering plate, as that is what we can afford. But for some who may be in a different place in life, there are other practical ways to provide financial support to our church while gaining direct tax advantages. For those with qualified retirement accounts who, because of age, must take their REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION each year, that money comes with a tax liability. Those not needing their distribution for regular living expenses often look for ways to turn that excess income into a charitable donation in a way that decreases their tax obligations.

The QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DONATION allows that income to be directly donated to any qualified 501(c)(3) organization, like First Methodist Church of Zephyrhills, without adding to the donor's tax burden for that year. There are limitations and exclusions, of course, so it is always best to work through a professional financial advisor to set this up. But the good news is that a well defined path is already in place for converting excess retirement income into a tax exempt donation that will go directly to work supporting your charitable intentions.
