Read about our accommodations just for new mothers. See page 4 of this publication.


Restrooms






Thrift Shops [Team Leaders ~ Lyn Sears, Main Shop; Terry Dutkiewicz, Annex]



WHAT IS DIABETES?

People with diabetes either don't make enough insulin (type 1 diabetes, autoimmune disorder) or can't use insulin properly (type 2 diabetes). Insulin allows blood sugar (glucose) to enter cells, where it can be used for energy. When the body doesn't have enough insulin or can't use it effectively, blood sugar builds up in the blood. **High blood sugar levels can lead to heart disease, stroke, blindness, kidney failure, and amputation of toes, feet, or legs.**

SOME FACTS ABOUT DIABETES

- Diabetes is the 7th leading cause of death in the United States.
- It's the leading cause of kidney failure, lower limb amputation, and adult-onset blindness.
- Risk factors include being overweight, having a family history of type 2 diabetes, being physically active less than three times a week, or having a fasting blood sugar result above 100. Results above 100 is known as pre-diabetes. Above 126 is full on diabetes.
- The rate of new cases of diagnosed diabetes in the United States has begun to fall, but the numbers are still very high. More than 29 million Americans are living with diabetes.

HEALTH COMPLICATIONS FROM DIABETES

- **Heart disease and stroke:** People with diabetes are twice as likely to have heart disease or a stroke as people without diabetes—and at an earlier age.
- **Blindness and other eye problems:** Diabetic retinopathy (damage to blood vessels in the retina), cataracts (clouding of the lens), and glaucoma (increase in fluid pressure in the eye) can all result in vision loss.
- **Kidney disease:** High blood sugar levels can damage the kidneys long before a person has symptoms. Kidney damage can cause chronic kidney disease, which can lead to kidney failure.
- **Amputations:** Diabetes damages blood vessels and nerves, particularly in the feet, and can lead to serious, hard-to-treat infections. Amputation is sometimes necessary to stop the spread of infection.

PREDIABETES: OPPORTUNITY FOR CHANGE

More than a third of American adults—around 86 million—have prediabetes, and 90% of them don't know it. With prediabetes, blood sugar levels are higher than normal, but not high enough yet to be diagnosed as diabetes. People with prediabetes have an increased risk of developing diabetes, heart disease, and stroke.

Last month during our two October 19th services, our church commissioned a new Stephen Ministry Leader, Jeanne Narum. Stephen Leaders are laypeople, church staff members, and pastors of all ages and from diverse backgrounds who share a common passion: bringing Christ's love and care to hurting people. They use their gifts of teaching, leadership, organization, and administration to help make Stephen Ministry happen.



Stephen Leaders recruit, train, lead, and support Stephen Ministers—lay caregivers who use their gifts of empathy, listening, mercy, and service to provide one-to-one, distinctively Christian care to people experiencing life difficulties. You do not need to be formally trained as a Stephen Minister to serve as a Stephen Leader.

The steps to becoming a Stephen Leader are to attend the Stephen Leader Training Course and then be commissioned by your congregation. The Stephen Leader training equips the new Stephen Leader to establish, maintain, and strengthen Stephen Ministry in our congregation. The new Stephen Ministry leader will gain the knowledge, skills, and resources needed to establish, maintain, and grow this vital Stephen Ministry program within our church.

Skills are taught through a variety of teaching and learning methods—including presentation, group discussion, video, and skill practice activities—for an engaging, enjoyable and productive training experience.

Faith Responders [Local Church Liasons ~ Lorne Becker and Tanna Day]


As Hurricane Season has progressed this year, I found myself praying more and more for a quiet calm season as I know MANY of you have been doing as well. After the damage and destruction experienced in the 2024 season from Debby, Helene and Milton, we just needed a *break*.

There are thousands of folks still recovering, living in temporary housing and working hard to return to a new normal, a new life after being impacted last fall. So this week when we witnessed Tropical Storm Imelda take a hard right turn into the Atlantic following Erin, Gabrielle and Humberto - it brought to mind a story from a devotional I was reading recently told by Charles Inglis:

George Muller, while making the voyage to America, encountered a very dense fog surrounding the ship. Muller approached the captain, Charles Inglis, on the bridge saying, "Captain, I have come to tell you that I must be in Quebec on Saturday afternoon". When informed that was impossible, he replied "Very well. If the ship cannot take me, God will find some other way. I have never broken an engagement in fifty-seven years. Let us go down to the chartroom and pray." The captain replied, "Mr. Muller do you know how dense this fog is?" Charles Inglis tells - I got up and the fog was indeed gone and George Muller was in Quebec on Saturday for his engagement.

Let's **KEEP PRAYING!** Let's focus our eyes on the living God who controls every circumstance of our lives and praise him for a quiet season.






Spotlight < Photos from Chili Cook-Off and Pumpkin Carving



Falling Back [Why do we change our clocks twice each year?]

On November 2nd, 48 states in our country will change their clocks back into standard times after being on Daylight Savings Time since early March. Colorado and Hawaii opted out of the system and let their times run naturally. The concept of adjusting clocks to take advantage of more or less sunlight during the regular day, was first formalized in Germany during WWI as a way of conserving needed wartime fuel. The US adopted the concept temporarily a few years later, then again during WWII as part of nation-wide war rationing efforts. After the war, individual states sporadically adopted DST, but the nation, as a whole, didn't follow suit until 1966 when it adopted the Uniform Time Act. Ongoing debates over the usefulness and general safety of changing clocks twice a year generally focus on energy conservation and the potential safety and health impacts of the ritual. Studies over the years have been inconclusive, but many hint at the subtle dangers of trying to alter time to fit our own needs and wishes. Currently, twenty states have resolutions to move to daylight savings time permanently and in 2022 the Sunshine Protection Act was introduced to make that change on a national level, but the debate is on-going and only time will tell its outcome.

This Month's Cover [November - "Due Season"]

No matter where one lives in this country, the late autumn months are painted in people's minds with the golden leaves, red apples, and orange pumpkins of harvest, even if some of those elements have to be trucked in from miles away or rendered in plastic as "seasonal décor". But here in Central Florida, local farmers are busy PLANTING for the winter growing season and now is the time one sees new green fields of strawberries and onions replacing the empty brown fields of the hot summer. Our "due season" is generally before June for winter plantings and after January for fall plantings. But due it is, after the same necessary labor and patience that farmers all over the country work into their fields to earn that harvest celebration.

It's telling in many ways that the Bible is home to so many parables and metaphors that relate to farming and husbandry, not simply because of their importance to the agrarian culture in which it was written but also because the images evoke universal life themes and have continued to do so down through the ages. The term, "Due Season" can be found in the King James Translation in Galatians 6:9 where it reminds readers that the harvests of their good works will come "when the time is right" and only after patience and hard work. So often the fruits of our spiritual labors, the prayers, donations, fellowships, and ministries, don't appear until long after we have moved onto other things and that work is no longer our focus. It's tempting to wonder if the labor was worth the harvest if we don't often "see" the results first hand. What Galatians reminds us is that "Due Season" is not ours to plan or celebrate, but God's, and that our harvests will be secure if only we don't tire of doing HIS work.
