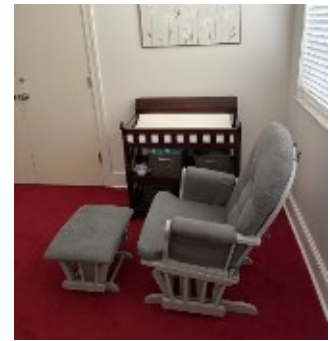

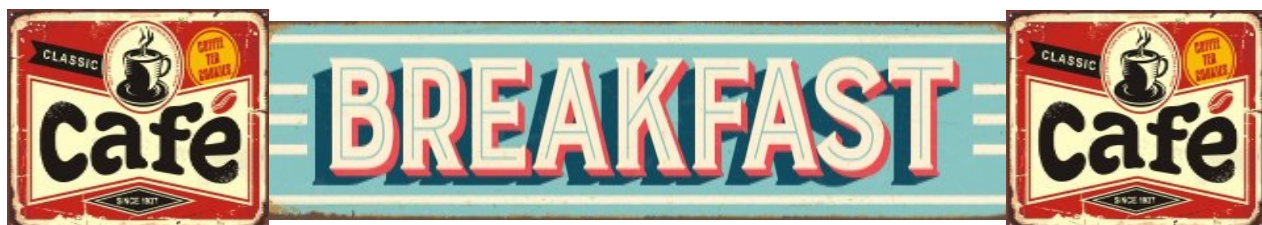
Sanctuary Support [Team Leader ~ Karen Harwell]

FMCZ Outreach Devotional Services

This past year, an Assisted Living Outreach program was formed by several members of our church. In this outreach our volunteers provide spiritual support to residents who reside in area Assisted Living facilities. Currently we provide a worship service at the American House of Zephyrhills on a monthly basis. Our worship service includes prayer, scripture reading, music and a short sermon. Before and after each service, we offer fellowship to those in attendance and share our faith with those residents unable to attend services outside their facility. Worship services and group activities offer a sense of community and connection for residents who may be isolated. This ministry helps residents feel valued and included in our congregation, strengthening their faith and providing comfort during challenging times.

Walk to Emmaus [Team Leaders ~ Dave and Roz Hill]

"Did not our hearts burn within us while He talked with us on the road and opened the scriptures to us?"
Luke 24:32.

When I first heard of the Walk to Emmaus, I thought my fellow church members were referring to the Pre-Easter walk our church had participated in carrying a large cross through the neighborhood streets. What I found was that it's a Christian retreat; an intense 72 hours of spiritual growth within a facility with other believers of Jesus Christ. There are separate sessions for adult women and adult men. I had the privilege of being an Emmaus pilgrim at one of the yearly walks, which are associated with the Upper Room publication organization (you many have read their monthly devotional material). During your 72 hour retreat you are pampered by a staff of "angels", enjoy 3 meals a day, never have to make your bed and, most attractive for me, you experience a spiritual unity with other Christians as they blossom in their faith, learning how to be the hands and feet of Jesus in your local church and community. The Emmaus experience continues after the Walk with small group sessions to keep us accountable and growing as well as monthly Gatherings – pot luck meals and worship.

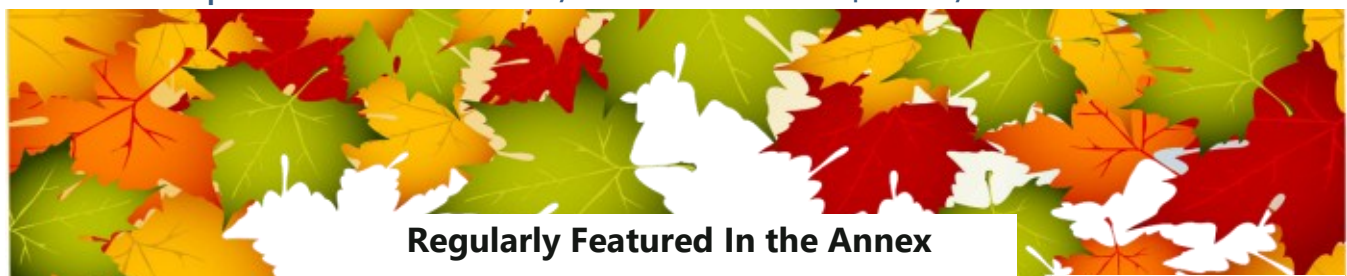

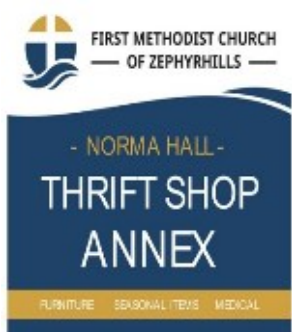

Spotlight < Farm Workers Self-Help, Inc.

Often, local resource and advocacy groups focus on a narrow range of services for the communities they serve. But Farm Workers Self-Help has a history of providing a long list of resources and activities to both its members and as outreach to surrounding communities. The group offers the opportunity and means for its members, particularly children and young adults, to explore, express, and celebrate their culture. One such example is the “Dreamers Teatro Crew”. DTC is a theatre troupe based out of Dade City, FL, organized under the auspices of the “Farmworker’s Self-Help Organization,” and comprised primarily of the “Dreamer” high school/college students living in the Lock Street area. Together, original, theatrical works of art are created that are improvised, workshopped, rehearsed, written, and performed for the Spanish-speaking community surrounding them, as well as the English-speaking community at large.



Here are some of the ways DTC serves as a vital resource within the Farm Workers Self-Help group:

- provide a vehicle to analyze, learn, and recognize human behavior on a level familiar to our members
- artistic medium/vehicle to constructively voice thoughts, views, opinions, frustrations, and curiosities about the world surrounding us
- serve an underrepresented, underserved community/demographic culture/population/people
- participate in the construction of an art representing a culture written for, by, and about those of that culture, and in both Spanish and English
- serve as social ambassadors to the community at large, interested in learning more about their community’s struggles, stories, and culture

Spotlight < Campus Repairs and Upgrades [FMCZ Trustees]

While our Trustees are responsible for coordinating an impressively long list of small replacement and repair projects around the campus, larger, more complicated renovation and upgrade projects are greenlit for active work whenever the schedule and financing become available. One such project is the renovation of the second floor office (empty and unused for a long time) into the new Technology office. Extensive plumbing work has just been completed while new window treatments and a new air conditioning unit has been installed to make the space functional. Next step - furniture!

An even larger renovation project is underway, started in late September. The three front rooms in the church office building, which include offices for the Pastor and the Office Manager, and the main Reception area, are finally getting a well-deserved modernization. The old paneling is being removed, new drywall installed, new electrical runs, décor upgrades, and of course a new paint scheme are all in the works. The goal is to present a contemporary and professional atmosphere to those who do business with our staff or who are visiting our offices for the first time.

Domestic Violence affects everyone. It knows no boundaries, it affects all races, all ethnicities, all economic classes, all ages, all religions – all communities. Domestic violence can be defined as a pattern of abusive behavior used to establish power and control within the context of an intimate relationship. It can include:

Physical Abuse: Hitting, Slapping, Kicking, Choking, Pushing, Punching, Burning, Using a Weapon or Other Object to Cause Injury

Sexual Abuse: Forcing a Partner to Engage in Unwanted Sexual Acts, Refusing to Practice Safe Sex, Degrading Treatment

Verbal Abuse: Constant Criticism, Making Humiliating Comments, Name-calling, Mocking, Yelling, Swearing

Emotional Abuse: Denying/Shifting Blame, Treating a Partner as an Inferior, Making Up Impossible “Rules” and Punishing the Victim for Breaking Them, Isolation, Monitoring Correspondence and Whereabouts, Abusing Children or Pets, Destruction of Property, Stalking, Using Threatening Actions or Gestures, Making the Victim Feel Guilty, Being Overly Jealous

Financial Abuse: Preventing a Partner from Getting or Keeping a Job or Attending School, Denying Access to Financial Information and/or Family Income, Damaging or Ruining a Partner’s Credit

Domestic violence isolates a survivor, reduces their options to leave the relationship, has a negative impact on the children in the household, affects their ability to work, can lead to a perpetrator stalking the survivor and has a high risk of ending in life-threatening violence or death. A safety plan is an important first step if you are in or have been in a violent relationship.

Sunrise of Pasco County is a multi-faceted domestic violence and sexual assault center providing a safe place for survivors to heal and plan their future. It offers a 24-hour/7 day a week hotline for persons affected by domestic and sexual violence that provides information on how to get help for a loved one, options and services available for survivors, community referrals or someone to just listen. The hotline is **CONFIDENTIAL**. If you are in immediate danger you should call 911 or your local emergency number immediately. **Sunrise's 24-hour hotline (321) 521-3120**

Stephen Ministry [Team Leader ~ Dave Hill]

Stephen Ministry is a lay-led program in Christian congregations that trains and organizes church members to provide high-quality, one-on-one care to individuals experiencing difficult times. Founded in 1975, this ministry provides emotional and spiritual support to people in the congregation and the community.



What Stephen Ministers do:

- Provide Christ-centered care: Ministers are trained to listen, care, encourage, and offer prayer, connecting the hurting person with God's love.
- Offer one-on-one support: A Stephen Minister meets regularly, typically once a week, with an assigned "care receiver" for as long as the need for care exists.
- Walk with, not fix: They are trained to walk alongside someone in need, rather than trying to solve their problems for them.
- Maintain confidentiality: The caring relationship is built on trust, confidentiality, and respect.
- Address life crises: This support is for individuals going through a variety of crises, including grief, divorce, job loss, chronic or terminal illness, or relocation.

Stephen Ministry is intended to supplement, not replace, pastoral care. It is based on the idea that pastors cannot meet all the care needs of their congregation alone. By equipping qualified laypeople to assist when possible, it empowers the entire congregation to provide meaningful, Christ-centered care.

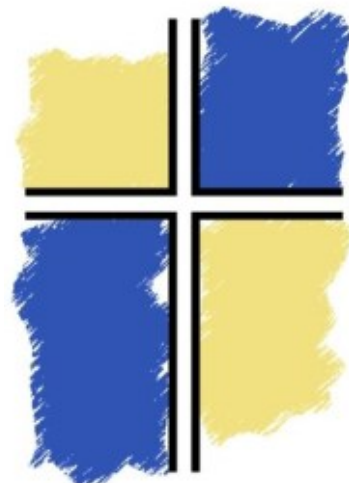
In addition, this funding will allow us to serve more communities recovering from Hurricanes Helene and Milton while enhancing our readiness for future response. ***Long after the headlines fade, we remain on the ground, repairing homes, restoring hope, and walking with survivors through the rebuilding process offering both practical help and the love of Christ wherever it's needed most.***

The Faith Responders journey began following Hurricane Ian. In partnership with Wesleyan Covenant Association and the Global Methodist Church, pastors and laity in Florida organized volunteers and resources for survivors. God has continued to provide resources and opportunities to assist those in need following Hurricane Idalia, Tallahassee tornadoes, wildfires, severe Hurricanes Debby, Helene, Milton and most recently the spring storms of 2025 and Texas flooding.

To everyone who has ***prayed, donated, deployed, or simply followed our journey, THANK YOU!*** This win is yours too. It's an honor to serve alongside you as the Body of Christ, shining light into some of the hardest places.

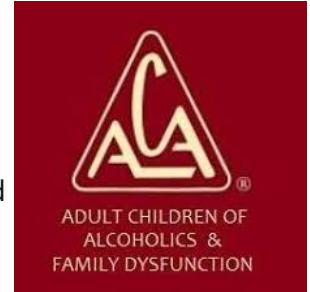

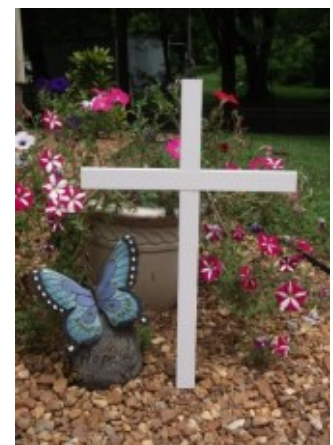
Yard Crosses [Rich Vogel and Gary Hartman]

The Story Behind the Crosses: Two years ago, an atheist living in Frankenmuth, MI, complained about crosses on a bridge in town. He requested that they be removed, and the town removed them. He then decided that since he was so successful with that, the city shield be changed as it had a heart symbol with a cross inside, signifying the city's Lutheran beginning. The residents decided they had enough. Hundreds of residents made known their opinion by placing small crosses in their front yards. This quiet but powerful statement from a community made the atheist withdraw his complaint. Those simple crosses remain in those front yards today. Those crosses after two years are still there. This is a powerful and inspiring message for all Americans passing them every day. It is time to take this idea across America.

The Local Response: Begun originally by then FUMCZ members Frank Cahill and Roy Burnside, the goal was simply to provide simple white crosses to all who want to make this small but powerful public statement of faith at their own home. Acknowledging how richly God has blessed our country, each cross outwardly gives thanks for these blessings and signifies to all of faith that they are not alone. According to current team leader, Rich Vogel, after Frank and Roy had both passed away, he was given the remaining stock of crosses by Frank's wife, and put them at his home for anyone who wanted one. Just as the stock was running low, church member, Jess Harmon saw the need and said simply, "I can make these." This led to a collaboration lasting several years until a car accident left Jess unable to continue the work. It wasn't long before another member, Gary Hartman, stepped up to take over building the crosses while Rich still paints.

Crosses are available either in the Narthex or Cooper Hall. Crosses are free but donations to purchase materials are always most welcome!

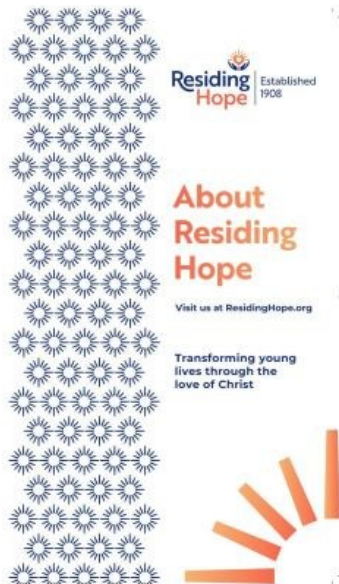

This Month's Cover [October - "The Beauty of Change"]

The bright colors of autumn leaves are always a popular subject for landscape photographers and painters. Even in Florida, not known climatically for an especially colorful transition from summer into winter, the brilliant reds, oranges, and yellows appear everywhere this time of year, even if it takes going to the Hobby Lobby seasonal aisles to find them. Autumn is a curious disconnect when you really think about it, for the beauty of the season that we celebrate in our art and décor is the product of nature dying; shedding all that was once green and vibrant to wither away and crumble on the ground. Ah, but what wondrous beauty and majesty there is in that death, for we know with certainty that it leads to new life and an awakening come spring. That faith in eventual renewal allows us all to focus our attention on the beauty of the change rather than on the loss it signifies, on the magnificent effect of color and not the crumbling vitality of its cause.

For those of faith, Autumn brings into sharp focus how fundamental the notion of change is in our physical world. In Ecclesiastes 3 we are reminded that *"There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens . . . [that] He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end."* So while we see change, loss, and the turmoil of transition all around us, our hearts hold fast to the peace that comes from knowing that beyond comes renewal, growth, and new life. It is this awareness of eternity in our hearts that allows us to celebrate change rather than be daunted by it. This promise, at the very root of our faith, gives us the perspective to understand that seasons are God's way to keep moving us all forward, casting off the old, making way for the new, and always moving toward Him.
