Mothers' Room offers live streaming of each service and a quiet place for mothers to attend to the needs of their small children. Located through the door to the right of the altar platform.

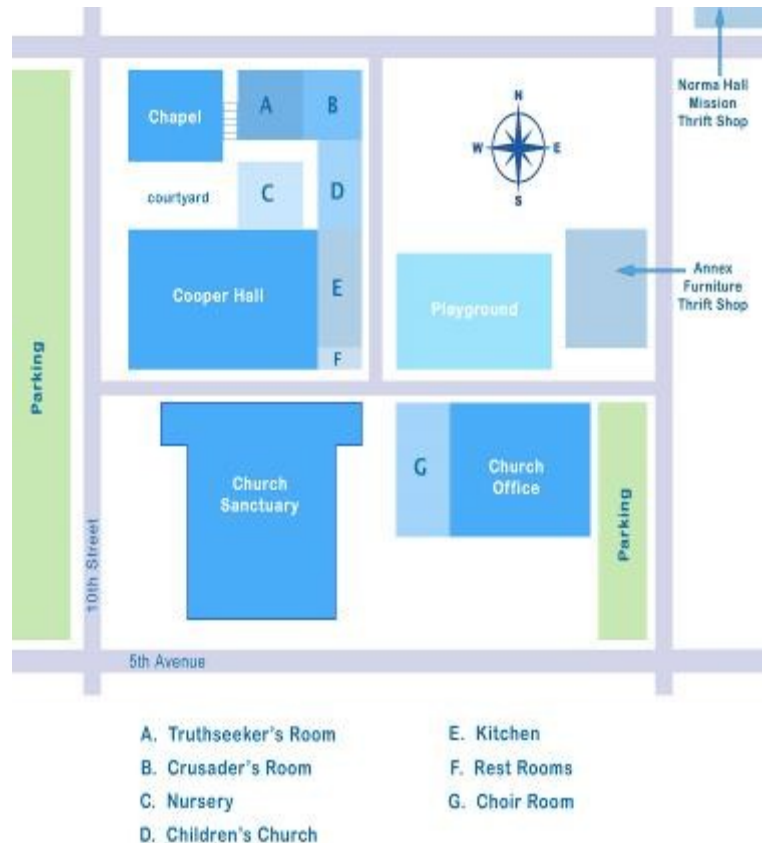
Restrooms

February 2026 Worship Services

Worship Themes

February begins with the end of one series and ends with the beginning of a new one, a Lenten worship series on the work of the Holy Spirit, leading up to and including Easter. The Holy Spirit is the least known or understood person of the Trinity. Historic mainline Christians tend to emphasize God the Father, evangelical and independent Christians, emphasize God the Son, and Pentecostal and charismatic Christians tend to emphasize God the Spirit. Yet the God we know and serve has revealed Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is fully God, equal to the Father and Son, yet distinct from them in role. This seven-week worship series will help us understand the work of the Holy Spirit in our lives to give us a more holistic understanding of the God who created us and loves us.

In between these two series will be two stand-alone sermons looking at general questions about our faith and denomination often asked of Pastor Steve by both visitors and congregational members.

REGARDING OUR RECENT REQUEST FOR EGG CARTONS

Recently the Food Pantry put out a special request for boxes of cereal and empty egg cartons. First, thank you so much for your response to our plea. You responded with the generosity and promptness that is so characteristic of our church family. But there were questions, too. Cereal is a common pantry staple and we always need cereal, but egg cartons? Normally the Pantry only requests donations of non-perishable canned and dry goods because we do not have the facilities to keep perishable foods like meats, dairy, and produce fresh and safe to eat between distribution days. However, a friend of the food pantry regularly donates eggs from their own home-grown stock; not enough to need storage between months, but enough to add one more important meal ingredient to as many distributed bags as possible each month. As the eggs are home-grown, they come to us in temporary containers, so we need egg cartons to put them in. This past month we had far more eggs than available cartons so we sent out the plea. What a blessing to have an over-abundance of good nutrition to offer to our Pantry families. Again, thank you very much for your response; we are well-stocked on cartons now for the next several months.



This month's special request is for **saltine crackers**. There are a number of our Pantry patrons who do not have cooking facilities where they stay, so the Pantry makes up special bags with items that do not need any further preparation. Crackers are a stable and versatile element of these AND our regular meal bags. Thank you for your donations!

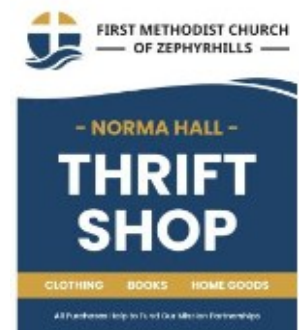
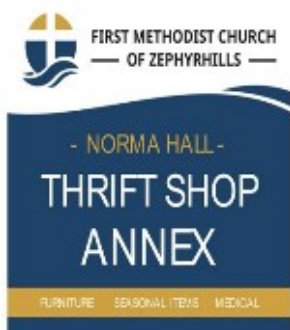

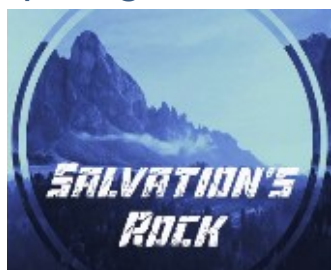

Patricia's song of choice for February is "Create in Me a Clean Heart" by Keith Green. Patricia writes, *"This is such a beautiful song. 10 Steps to Lower Triglycerides

Watching your cholesterol is nearly as common nowadays as watching your blood pressure or your weight. But do you watch your triglyceride levels?

Triglycerides are a type of fat that gives you energy. Similar to cholesterol, triglycerides are produced by your liver but can also come from food. Knowing the level of triglycerides circulating in your blood is important because high triglycerides indicate that you may be at increased risk for heart attack and stroke. Here's advice to help reduce your triglyceride levels.

Lose weight. If you're overweight, losing 5 to 10 percent of your body weight will reduce your triglycerides by approximately 20 percent.

Cut the sugar. Individuals whose added sugar intake is less than 10 percent of daily calories have the lowest triglyceride levels. The American Heart Association recommends that only 5 percent of your daily calories come from added sugars.

Stock up on fiber. Instead of consuming sugar and other refined carbohydrates, focus on more fiber-rich foods, such as vegetables, fruits and whole grains.

Limit fructose. Studies have found that consuming too much fructose -- a type of sugar -- leads to high triglycerides. High-fructose corn syrup is a major source of fructose. You can determine whether a food contains sugar or high-fructose corn syrup by reading the ingredients list.

Eat a moderately low-fat diet. You may be surprised to learn that diets that are very low in fat are not as effective at lowering triglycerides as diets moderately low in fat. The American Heart Association recommends that people with high triglycerides get about 25 to 35 percent of their daily calories from fat.

Watch the type of fat you eat. Cut back on saturated fats, which are found in red meat, poultry fat, butter, cheese, milk, and coconut and palm oils. Keep trans fats, found in shortening and stick margarine, to a minimum.

Add omega-3 fatty acids. Fatty fish such as salmon, herring, sardines, lake trout and albacore tuna are abundant in omega-3 fatty acids -- a type of fat that is actually good for you. To reap the benefits, the American Heart Association recommends that you eat fatty fish at least twice a week.

Exercise. If you have high triglycerides, getting at least 30 minutes of moderate-intensity physical activity most days of the week may lower your triglyceride levels.

Take triglyceride-lowering drugs. If your triglycerides are very high (500 mg/dL or above), your doctor might recommend a medication shown to lower triglycerides, such as fibrates, niacin, omega- or statins.

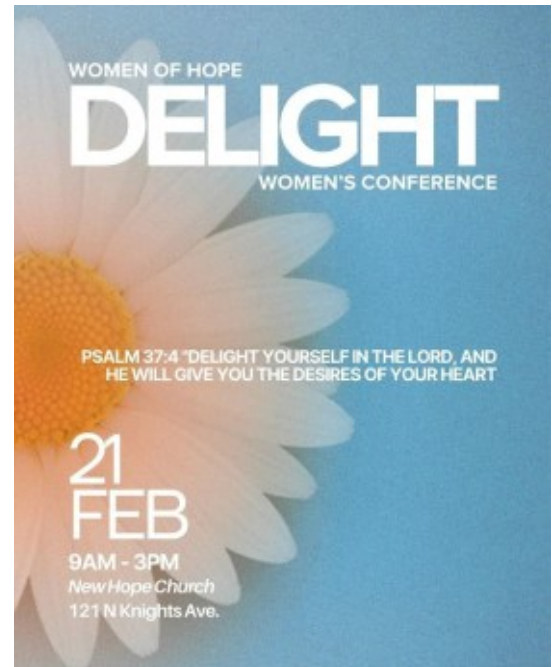

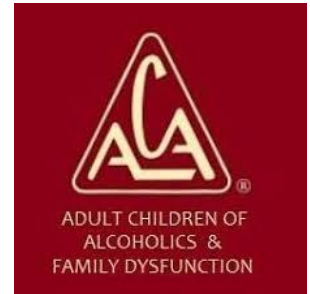

This Month's Cover [February - "Whispers of Spring"]

Just when we are ready to put the sweaters and hoodies back in long-term storage and begin to remember the consistent sunshine and warmth that Florida offers when there, comes another cold snap and we're right back in winter. We offer thankful prayers that the strawberry farmers were able to cover their fruits with protective ice in time, and that the kumquats have thus far avoided damage. Our area's signature mid-winter festivals, celebrating these fruits, are safe for another year! But still we stay tuned in to the weather reports and keep our warm clothing ready as insurance against more random cold snaps. And we grumble, when will the promised sun arrive again to stay?

Giving Back [Investing in Gardens and Orchards]

Charitable investment is a lot like growing fruits and vegetables. In the pursuit of planning and planting, growing a garden of vegetables and growing an orchard of fruit trees reflect two different but complementary paths, one focused on short-term production and the other on more long-term development. Garden investment reflects the weekly and monthly giving that makes our day to day functions and stewardship possible. We focus on funding those ongoing needs and supporting the ongoing activities of our members and missions. Garden investment may be in the forms of monthly tithing, regular electronic donations through our online portal, or even giving cash or checks in the Sunday offering plate to support specific funds and activities. The needs are on-going and the level of funding may rise and fall with the seasons. We plant and harvest in regular rotation, just like a vegetable garden and, in doing so, keep our family fed and our "lands" productive.



But, as any Florida gardener knows, vegetable growing is a fleeting pursuit. Crops are planted and replanted on a continuous rotation and as one crop is growing, you are already starting the seeds for the next. Orchards, on the other hand constitute larger investments and longer outlooks. They must be planned more carefully but usually require less daily work. Where the garden gives smaller, immediate returns, the orchard is an investment that can, with careful nurturing, provide sustenance not just now but far into the future, fruits for the good of those we don't even know. Gardens are for us now. Orchards are for us and our children and their children. Both investments are critical to feed a church family both now and in the future. As you give this year consider ways you can plant a garden for today's needs, while nurturing an orchard for tomorrow and beyond.
